Walker's Advent -

1854 Election of Pres between Charnier & Castellan - neither elected - Charnier declared himself elected arrested & banished Cas. who went to Honduras & returned to liberate his country - was at first successful except at Granada - then proclaimed Provisional Government & main so till his death Sept 1855.

Charnier after being besieged & his - sallied forth & re-joined the whole country except San Chiriquito & Realgo with northern San Crist. & bay of Gonave. Charnier then died & his chiefs then took up the war which raged with all the fury of savages.

Castellan then invited Walker to assist the American party. He accepted - triumphed & a government was organized by the election of Rivas Pres. which was recognized by U.S. Consul Wheeler.

U.S. Refused to recognize them - which was cause of subsequent wars as it would have been considered as a letter of protection Nov 1856. Later they were recognized by U.S. as President from N.

Character & Talents

Upon Walker's first landing at Realgo overtures were made to him to commence on his own cause which were promptly rejected.

After the capture of Granada he was elected by the first man of the country to accept the Pres which was declined. Elected as Col. & then by Commander in Chief.

Accomplished in a few years what 30 yrs of bloodshed had failed to effect - by superior energy, courage & intelligence. If he be a filibuster. Lopez, Delkoff, Kosciuszko, Pulaski & others are such. All fought in their great cause. Sympathizers Cass, Sumner & Miller. Recognized by C. as a "win & just measure". He says - if we are true to our duty the C. States will soon be free from

English pretensions &c

1742 - Attempted to seize whole Coast of C.A.

Successful & dishonest in all her treaties with Spain: 1814 Last Treaty with Sp by which she agreed to evacuate all her possessions & ports on Continent & Islands.

1848 2 B vessels entered harbor San Juan del Norte -

Also seized Jipen Island in Yumen Bay western terminus to the interoceanic transit route.

Clayton Bulwer treaty

Signed 1850 by which according to ~~English~~ interpretation Eng agreed not to exercise any territorial power in fact or name over any part of C.A. however or whenever acquired before or afterwards.

1852 Took possession of the "Bey Islands" as a "Colony"

1854. English despatched two days afterwards a B ship and took possession

1856 B. L. of Mr. Enygher Cp. British gave orders U.S. St. Angela should not depart as English had taken them back to U.S. Government officers

After W's conquest Eng offered aid to C.R. & other States in case of a collision with M.

B. W. Department furnished C.R. with arms & assistance of Eng sympathies. Lord Clarendon declared invasion by C.R. a "right step"

Antislavery butchers as captured towns by M. & B. of American sentiment by B. & J. Ashmun &c. so said by C.R. officers.

G. B. Antislavery she had a right to enter soldiers in U.S. 1857

Eng robbed Guatemala of Belize. Novelties of the
Revolution Islands (1852) & Nicaragua of the Musquito
territory.

Made an effort to revolutionize Cuba (1827) - brought
us to give the tripartite treaty & is now filling the Is-
land with negroes from Africa &c.

While we have done every thing to destroy our influence
she has been active in creating hers.

She has firmly resisted the dangerous appeals of
Nicaragua for the preservation of European influence.

In 1847 she wrote to us as the national protector of
all the Republican States of the Continent.

1851 wrote to Mr. Webster asking him our interference
in the Musquito territory &c.

During Mr. Clay's secretaryship offered us the Sthamer
vote in preference to all other nations.

Buchanan in instruction to our Minister Ch. D'Off says
Eng's object was possession of the Route.

Clay Pierce Webster & Buchanan all had state that Eng
had no right to Musquito Territory or Rio.

His treaty with Nicaragua gave us the route with
rights of ports (1847).

England held Gibraltar & Malta.

While our Administration whatever would take no
positive action for the security of our interests. It appeared
Walker & Eng furnished the C.R. with arms &
expressions of sympathy & wishes for the extirpation
of the Americans.

Decree of Nicaragua 1848.

"No what depth of degradation - to what sacrifice
of pride & honor - to what extent of humili-
ating submissiveness to Europe &c."

"Liberal opinions & bold policy may run into in-
considerate rashness; but prudent conservatism may
also degenerate into cowardly subservience."

"He pursues his high purpose with an energy, firm-
ness & courage worthy of a better fate. His
mood the firm & serene of one of the able
rulers of the age only because his efforts are un-
fortunate. While the leader of a revolution is
encouraged by success the unfortunate aspirant
is assailed with obloquy & his name shrouded
in disgrace."
