DESCRIPTIVE LIST AND ACCOUNT OF PAY AND CLOTHING OF

NOTES { 1.—The amount of BOUNTY PAY due, at date, will be carefully stated.
2.—Stoppages for loss or damage done to arms, or other public property, must be noted, and the articles, and particular damage to each specified.

6. J. Haysom left Saml. J. Randalls farm, 3 miles east of Meridian, for Blount Springs 8 P.M. he rode a small pony, could not saddle the pony, or wear shoes, so greatly afflicted with rheumatism.
5th At 10:30 A.M. at Simmons 2' east of Landerdale Springs, took dinner, cost 9c.

" At 6:30 P.M. at Swans 9' west of Livingston, took supper and bed, cost 2 1/2 no breakfast.
4th Arrived at Livingston 40' from Meridian at 7:30 A.M., at Wm. Jones Bluff 10:30 A.M. 49' from Meridian, sold the fore feet of pony shed, cost 4 1/2. At 7 P.M. at Wm. Bridgmanys 9' west of Canton - Adignays hospitality elegant.

3rd Arrived at Canton at 8 A.M. - 69' from Meridian - when leaving Canton, was overtaken by a gentleman mounted on a fine mule, who wanted to trade mule for pony, he may have stolen the mule, or suspected me going to the granges, at 8:30 A.M. lunched, 1 mile north of Canton at a fine Artesian well, at 9:30 pony very tired, rested him, dismounted his sides pained, did not use the spurs again. At 6 P.M. - 18' N.E. of Canton, rain coming on, stopped at Beales, the females hesitated to receive me, I put on airs, mounted and rode on, but seeing the rain near at hand, I went in the barn yard under shelter, they called me back, apologized, and treated me kindly, a good lesson for me. to learn to check my temper.

2nd At 9 A.M. in Tuscaloosa - 104' = At 10:2 miles N.E. finished lunch brought from home & Apple - I always take off every thing and let the pony graze - he is lazy this morning but appears well, I am physically well, better than for a long time, but feel as if an awful doom hung over me - perhaps insanity. At 12 M. at Browns 8' N.E. of Tuscaloosa fed pony 1 1/2 - too late for me to get anything to eat. At 7 P.M. D. Whites 21' N.E. Tuscaloosa, supper, bed, breakfast & pony feed 4 1/2. wanted the pony, depression coming.

1st At 12 M. at Moores fed pony 1 1/2. At 4 P.M. at Jonesborough 149'. At 7 P.M. D. Moore Fields 7 1/2 N.E. of Jonesborough, a very clever man.

10th At 12 M. at Belcher 21' S.W. of Blount Springs, at 7 P.M. at Jones a cleaver man - 196'. At 200 for supper, breakfast & pony feed = 10 miles south west of Blount Springs.

11th At 10 A.M. at Blount Springs. Duffey at Hotel refused me board - at 5 P.M. Samuel Foster took me to his home, he was perhaps 70 yrs, his wife 30 yrs, child 2 1/2 yrs, the best of people.
