Dear Professor Tristan,

Your letter of Dec.  
4, 1917, the very interesting photographs  
of the craters of Irazú, showing the  
eruptions of steam, etc., and the article  
"en la Informacion," and especially  
your report in "La Gaceta" all gave me  
the greatest pleasure to receive. I read  
them all very attentively and studied  
the photographs. I was able to identi-  
fy the various craters from your  
photographs before I read the legends  
under those which are reproduced in  
your report. On account of our three  
visits to Irazú and especially of  
our camp there in the last day of  
March & first day of April, 1910, we  
feel that we know some places in  
Irazú very well and are consequently  
deeply interested in whatever happens

there.

I received also the fotografhs which your brother don José María Tristán sent me from the craters of Irazú, as taken on his <sup>expedition</sup> of Dec. 20/17, and I <sup>writing</sup> him also about them <sup>de consulta</sup>.

Some of our students here have a "Naturalists' Field Club" and, as they asked me to speak to them at their meeting <sup>in</sup> January, I told them of our visits to Irazú and then of our account of the eruptions of 1917, showing your and your brothers pictures by means of a projecting lantern ("lanterna de proyección"). They were very much interested. I send you the copy of their program of this meeting.

Please accept my best thanks for sending me all these things. My -our- interest in Costa Rica continues as great as ever and we hope that in some future year, when

the great war is over, we may see  
the República and you again!

Speaking of Irazú, I have noticed a  
mistake in our book concerning it: on  
page 134, the date for Dr. Sapper's visit  
should be 1899 instead of 1889. We  
were very glad to learn of the lecture  
which <sup>senorita</sup> da Gallegos gave of her  
work at the Collegio.

I thank you also for the copy of  
Professor Gagini's book on "Los Aborig-  
enes de Costa Rica," which I would  
like to keep, if another copy can be  
spared for the library of the Uni-  
versity Museum. I believe that  
Prof. Frederic Starr, of the University  
of Chicago, is interested in this  
subject; perhaps Professor Gagini knows  
of his work.

We shall be anxious to know  
whether the eruptions of Irazú have  
increased or decreased in intensity,  
as you will <sup>have</sup> learned if you have made

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another visit to the volcano in January.

For myself I have been very much occupied with the teaching at the University and the editing of "Entomological News", but I hope this year to do more with the study of the Costa Rican Odonata.
